On December 9th, 2924 Havelock lost one of its most recognizable citizens, Karen (Miz) Watson. There are not enough words to describe our loss. Many of you have written kind words and shared your memories of Miz on the Tribute Book found on the Brett Funeral Home website. I would encourage everyone to check out the tributes posted by so many people who knew Miz.

My interaction with Miz was limited to the last few years but I saw her as a person who had the personality and skills of a five star general but when there was work to be done she was the best soldier you could find on the planet. She was always the first to volunteer when an organization needed to complete a project, I can still hear Miz saying: "get err done" and she would step up and make things happen.

When the Rail held the first meeting to discuss the structure of the paper, Miz suggested a recipe for every paper. After a brief discussion everyone agreed and before the sun had set the next day, Miz had submitted a recipe. She continued to provide recipes for the Rail and it became a popular feature of the paper.

Richard Wood, a local business owner, suggested to me that if Havelock had a dozen citizens like Miz, we would have the best town in the world.

The Rail team extends our sincere condolences to the Watson family.

### **ELMER'S EDITORIAL**

### HAVELOCK BELMONT PUBLIC SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM RECEIVES GENEROUS INJECTION

The Havelock Belmont Public School (HBPS) has received an early Christmas Present!

I would like to give a **GIGANTIC SHOUTOUT** to **Sara (Tasson)** and **Anthony Quinn** of **Bennett Mechanical Inc.**, who **presented** a very generous check to Jason Huffman, Principal of Havelock Belmont Public School for the **Breakfast Program**. Sara attended Havelock Belmont Public School in the mid 80's; and most of her family grew up, or are still living in the area. She has always loved it here and she convinced Anthony to build their dream cottage on Belmont Lake where they now spend most of their time. Sara and Anthony wanted to give back to the community and after researching and careful consideration they felt that the Breakfast program at HBPS required a "much-needed" injection.

Probably unbeknownst to most, the Havelock Belmont Public School has been providing healthy nutritious breakfasts for over 25 years to our students. Students need nourishing food to help them learn and stay focused; and research has shown that they have trouble learning when they are hungry at school. Every school day morning at HBPS, Miz Watson (almost 25 years) and Vicki Carter (17 years) and their team would prepare breakfasts for between 30 and 50 children. Miz Watson reluctantly had to resign due to health reasons, but I want to recognize the incredible impact and difference she has made to the students of this school. Other volunteers have now stepped up to the plate and are able to continue this program. The school volunteers: 3 staff members; Alana Lawson, Cindy Herdman and Valerie McMaster now coordinate this extremely beneficial program.

There is a tremendous amount of work accomplished behind the scenes to be able to provide these kids with a nutritious breakfast each day and we are thankful for the volunteers' commitment and dedication! A quick summary of the process begins with the support staff working out the requirements and purchasing the food as well as preparing and setting up the food in a room. Children then come in from the yard and help themselves to some

nutritious, high protein meals before going to class; of course, clean-up follows afterwards. There is oatmeal, hardboiled eggs, toast, fruit, muffins and milk and much more. Once the school day begins, the volunteers distribute the remaining snacks throughout the classrooms in the school so everyone has access to some "energy" all day long. This is such a discrete and sensitive way to ensure our students are eating without judgement.

The program does receive funding from the Ministry; but most money is raised locally through fundraisers such as "Toonies for Tummies" which funds the "Student Nutrition Program" which in turn funds the breakfast program. They also rely on private local donations; so they were genuinely excited and pleased that Bennett Mechanical Inc. chose HBPS to receive this amazing boost for this very worthwhile breakfast program!

It should also be known that the HBPS Breakfast Program is actively looking for morning volunteers. If you live in Havelock and have time to help out in the early mornings; drop in to the office and reach out to one of the volunteers above.

Once again, thank you Sara and Anthony for making a difference in our community!



# CONLEY'S CORNER SKATE SHARPENING & CUSTOM PROFILING

Jeff Conley worked with Cag One for almost 15 years. Cag One was a business in Havelock that opened in 1987. There were times it was just Jeff and the owner. Cag One sold Cag One skate sharpening machines in North America to the NHL, and around the world. Recently the Havelock location was closed and the business

moved to Quebec City. Jeff had his own machines when the company decided to move and knew that skate sharpening was a service that is needed in this area, so he decided to open up a location at the corner of Oak Street and George St, East.

At Cag One skate sharpening machines were their bread and butter. They never sharpened skates for a living. They sold sharpening machines in North America to the NHL, and around the world. A lot of teams have their own machines now, and a lot of them are Cag Ones original machines, still in use. It' 30 year old technology, but there are no secrets any more. Newer machines haven't made big improvements. They tend to be more expensive, but they do the same job.

Jeff has travelled extensively training NHL Team staff on the ins and outs of the machines. He is looking forward to the summer off season because that is when past customers look to get maintenance done and their machines serviced. He expects things to get busy. He didn't get things going at his current location until about the middle of October. He just started advertising a few weeks ago. Advertising isn't something he's used to doing, but his new job will need it to get the word out.

Jeff told me "You'd be surprised on how many people have them at their homes you know, they actually do, and 30 years ago, it was the greatest thing ever. If you had a family and, everybody skated it made sense. A lot

of the machines that have come out today are home units. Commercial machines are about 10 grand. And now you can get home units for like \$1500.

Jeff has a lot of past customers inside a four-hour radius. He has many customers in the states as well as through Canada. Come summertime he'll be busy. "I've got a lot of regulars that want to keep it local and they've been my customers for 14 plus years, and they want to stay that way"

When Jeff is sharpening, he is actually adjusting the profile or the gliding surface. Depending on the skater and their needs you might want to move the profile closer to the front or back. Jeff talks to the skater and gives them a neutral profile and tells them to go ahead and skate on it. When they come back they tell him about their experience and he adjusts the profile as required. Most skaters love neutral because that is where most skate. However the need to provide a custom profile is why Jeff's customers come back.

Jeff is focused on sharpening now, but if the need is there in the future, he may consider selling additional products in the store. He is confident he will make a go of it. As he says "It doesn't matter the age group, or the skill level. It starts with your skates. You can put the best player on the ice, but it starts with us. And that's one of the things I focused on when I used to train people, I used to put that in their heads, that it's an important service. I have people now that drive, 45 minutes, past seven, eight of these machines to get here, and they come to see me because I'm the guy sharpening their skates. I'm in here, sometimes until 10 o'clock at night. Because people are calling me saying, "We're going to the Liftlock Tournament" or "We're going to Pembroke tomorrow morning for seven."

If you have skates that need sharpening, Jeff and Conley's Corner are now an option.



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### BELMONT WOMEN'S INSTITUTE DIGS UP TIME CAPSULE

Did you know that the **Belmont Women's Institute** has been in operation since 1915?

The mission of the Women's Institute was for members to actively work together for family, home, community and country. Their objective was to improve women's skills in the art of homemaking and childcare. Over the years, what they have achieved is a stronger voice for women by working together as a united group. The WI's most notable initiative is the ROSE program which encourages their members to become more knowledgeable on social, health and environmental issues. Today there are about 2,000 members in 184 branches across Ontario.

The **Belmont Women's Institute** started out with between 40 and 50 members and they are now down to 8. You would think that this would break the spirit of the institution but they still seem happy and content! But they are always welcoming new members. This organization gets together monthly to share fun and fellowship. They are advocates for women, hosting educational workshops to teach and enhance their lifestyles and build friendships. They have crafts and demonstrations; group outings; dinners; lunches; theatre events, musical nights; book readings, baking classes; just to name a few.

This year they hosted a *Craft and Artisan Show* at the Hall during The Heart of *Hastings Christmas Tour* as a fundraiser. As a non-profit organization they need to fundraise. But this year there was a twist, and with the help of two volunteers aged 13, Mitchell Deline and a friend, a search for a time capsule buried there in 1996, was underway. In 1996, The Belmont Women's Institute branch and the Peterborough District Women's Institute; along with the Honourable MP Peter Adams buried the capsule. This was a historical day for the members of the Belmont Women's Institute (located on Hwy 7 East of Havelock).

Over the years, the exact location of the capsule had become a mystery as the original marker had disappeared. Mitchell and Haley, metal detector in hand, scanned the area; digging deep with every sound; and before they realized it, they uncovered their exclusive find; the time capsule! They were now a part of history too!

The Belmont WI members were grateful and excited to see what the capsule contained as Havelock, Norwood, Belmont, North Shore, Westwood, Mount Pleasant and Shelwyn Chapters were included. There were pins and badges; a list of the town council at the time; a newspaper

clipping with the front page story "3M Closing Its doors". But the most treasured items were the letters that representatives of each branch wrote so eloquently, describing their appreciation for the group now; and their hopes and dreams for the organization in the future. Some felt that women will always need support but thankfully, that has been proven wrong! It is a group of strong, intelligent and fun women wanting to connect.

From speaking with Donna Kent and Marilyn Belanger, I feel that they enjoy the friendships they have developed and the skills they have learned. One thing you might not know is that they help residents in the community who could be struggling: fire victims; cancer patients; the elderly and shut-ins, by providing them with temporary aid to help ease the burdens they are facing. This is all done behind the scenes without recognition. I think it's time we recognize what they do for the community. They will be burying another time capsule this year. What hidden treasures will it hold for the future?

As I said earlier, they are actively looking for new members. Why not join a great group of women, get together once a month, share some stories and laughs, learn new activities and help support your community as women. 
putting together all the goody bags.




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# PRIMARY HEALTH CARE IN PETERBOROUGH COUNTY

Did you know you can register your need for a family doctor in our region WITHOUT deregistering with your current doctor, if you have one? All you need to do is complete the Healthcare Needs Assessment form located at the Peterborough County website. Most people will need to complete just 1 form per household. This form is replacing any other family doctor wait lists you might already be on, including the provincial Health Care Connect.

Lori Richey, Healthcare Advancement Coordinator, spoke in HBM in November about the Needs Assessment. Lori's primary job is to attract and retain family physicians in Peterborough County. To do so, she needs to understand the primary care needs of our community. The Needs Assessment is a key piece of that puzzle. The more people who complete the form, the more data Peterborough County will have to assess and design physician and nurse practitioner recruitment strategies to meet the needs of our community.

The Ontario College of Family Physicians states there are +32,000 people across Peterborough city and county without a family doctor, and that number is expected to grow. The need is real, and so are the challenges. One of the biggest challenges with finding a family doctor is that there are fewer family medicine graduates every year (30% of 2023 graduates pursued a family medicine speciality, down from 38% in 2015), and many of them opt not to open a family medicine practice.

A key driver of this decline is how family doctors are paid on Ontario. While I found different numbers from different sources, the Ottawa Citizen noted in its August 7, 2024 article that a family doctor in Ontario earns about \$373,000 per year on average. Other specialists (oncologists, urologists etc.) earn about \$382,000, and surgical specialists about \$507,000. On top of making less than their peers in the profession, a family medicine office is a business, with all the overhead for rent and supplies and equipment, nurse and reception salaries and benefits, and all the paperwork and other administration that a business entails. This overhead comes out of the family doctor's pocket, eating into his or her earning power. Family doctors are not poor, but they aren't getting rich either.

Lori Richey is working with other regions across eastern Ontario to attract doctors to our region, including repatriating Canadian-trained doctors back to Canada and other international recruitment efforts. At the same time, a new Patient Resource Guide has been developed for those who do not currently have a primary care provider to learn about options for seeking care in our region, available at the Peterborough County website.

What can you do? Complete the Healthcare Needs Assessment form. Check out the Patient Resource Guide to learn about options for care. Tell all your friends who are doctors about how wonderful it is to live and work in our region, and then pass his or her name to Lori to close the deal!

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### **RECIPE**

### APPLE WALNUT CAKE

#### Ingredients:

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 apples peeled, cored and sliced
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/4 cups vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and flour a 9x13-inch pan. Sift flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt into a bowl; set aside. Combine apples and white sugar in a separate bowl; set aside. Mix brown sugar, oil, eggs, and vanilla together until well combined. Stir in apple mixture, then flour mixture. Fold in walnuts. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake in the preheated oven for 45 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean. Allow to cool. Very nice topped with a cream cheese frosting or served with whip cream.



#### Meetings held on December 3 and 17, 2024.

- Mayor Martin opened the meeting with respect to the Land Acknowledgement. Reminding Councillors that when commenting or asking questions, with follow ups, all need to be put through the chair. A problem when the Mayor needs to remind this council.
- Delegation Mike Vilneff, The Loomex Group, re Community Risk Assessment. This is a government driven need, that all communities need
  to complete. What threats a community faces such as Geographic's, Building, Critical Infrastructure, Demographic, Hazards's, Public Safety
  Response, Community Services, Economics. HBM township needs to identify the risks and follow Treatment Measures. Top Five Risks for HBM
  township are Sever Weather, Highway incident, Human Health emergency, Fire, Localized Flooding. Suggesting that these be updated each
  year.
- Council passed motion to assume a portion of Sandy Lake road that crosses private property after the area was surveyed. This portion of Sandy Lake road assumed will now become a Public Highway.
- Environmental Grant Application from Cordova Lake Cottage Association for a maximum of \$1000.00 to fund E. Coli testing. Motioned and carried.
- Delegation Bryon Tan from Watson and Associated Economist Ltd. In regards too Developmental Charges. This being the 3rd presentation stating and hopefully the last, before getting to the actual charges. This meeting focused on Waste Water Management providing important data. Quoting 92% usage in town with 8% for potential growth. Potential charges ranged from new build which would cost \$5700 to hook up to waste water, being one example. With others listed with varying amounts, as Multiples, Apartment, Bachelor, just to flush your toliet. To continue in new year.
- Norwood Medical Center became a focus of conversation. With some definite displeasure at Norwood wanting payment for our residents to
