Visiting local grocery outlets during Victoria Day weekend, you were greeted by massive displays of American corn.

Now that we are getting ready for June we will be swamped by truck loads of American strawberries in the run up to fresh juicy Ontario berries by mid June. And of course there will be a price drop once the local berries are available. The imports will drop their price and Ontario growers will have to follow suit.

All this is to say, many consumers have been boycotting products that have 'product of USA' on the label and they should pay attention to where out of season produce originates from. The greenhouse industry in Ontario is growing and they are producing strawberries but you need to closely check the labels on the packaging.

The bigger picture is that we should be eating what Ontario and Canada grows in season. The joke at the Havelock Farmer's Market is when we get a customer looking for corn in May. And last week, May 16, sure enough, we had a customer looking for corn. Our farmers only sell what grows in season. Society needs to do a better job of educating consumers regarding what we grow and when it is in season. Ontario fruit and vegetables are available frozen and in cans. The nutritional value is better than what is shipped in a truck for several days.


The Havelock Farmer's Market has some new vendors this season and they look forward to meeting local customers when their produce is available.

Just travel 6 km. north from the Village of Havelock on C 46 or Belmont 6th Line to Round Lake Road or continue C46 north to Anderson Rd. and follow to find a hidden gem in HBM. Like all of the East Kawartha Lakes, Round is clean, clear, and accessible. Boaters can launch boats at the HBM boat launch beside FR 40. Our lake has always been a "hot spot" for fishing including bass, perch, pickerel and muskie. It is a relatively shallow lake with the deepest spot 32 feet. The lake is a "limestone" lake and I remember an environmental assessment in the late 60's reporting no chance of acidity.



We enjoy swimming, fishing, boating, cottage breakfasts, outdoor sports like volleyball and badminton, cornhole, lawn darts and always BBQs with friends, bonfires and smores with the kiddos, or sitting quietly and listening to frog music, and amazing sunsets. Some residents enjoy playing hockey and curling on the lake in winter. Cross country skiing and skidoos are other winter pleasures. We look forward to playing pickleball in Havelock when the courts are finished. We are 10 minutes from the Village for the Senior's Club, Belmont Women's Institute at the Old Stone Hall, all the interesting shops, and the Legion and Lions Hall. FUN FACTS ABOUT THE PETERBOROUGH FEDERAL RIDING

- Peterborough has been represented in the House of Commons as a distinct federal riding since 1953, although its boundaries have shifted multiple times over the years.
- Since 1953, Peterborough has elected:
 - 5 Conservative Members of Parliament (serving a total of 36 years)
 - 3 Liberal MPs (33 years in total)
 - 1 New Democratic MP (2 years)
- Peterborough is known as a "bellwether riding"—
 meaning we typically elect a Member of Parliament
 from the party that goes on to form the federal
 government. In fact, only 4 elections since 1953 have
 bucked this trend.

The term "bellwether" dates back to the 15th century.
 Shepherds would place a bell around the neck of a lead, castrated male sheep (called a wether).
 The flock would follow this sheep, allowing the shepherd to locate the group by listening for the bell—hence, bellwether came to mean "leading indicator."

By the time you read this, the election will be over—so you'll know whether Peterborough has maintained its bellwether status once again!

MENTAL HEALTH TIP

As we go through our day, at home or work, sometimes thoughts begin to come to us. Maybe they are thoughts of to-do lists or worries. As these thoughts come, some people are fortunate and able to let them float right away. Some of us find they settle into our minds, and slowly more thoughts pile in until you start to feel like your mind is cluttered and overwhelming. This can create feelings of frustration, panic, anxiety, sadness and so many other unwelcome feelings.

If you are one of the many who find their thoughts piling up and becoming overwhelming, here is a mental exercise to try!

- 1. Take a pause. Notice what you are thinking and feeling. Imagine that thought taking up space in your brain. What is it?
- 2. Ask yourself, do I need to do something with this thought right now?
- 3. If the answer is yes, I need to do something, then stop and do it! But, if it is a thought that is irrelevant to this specific moment and not helping you with the current task, then imagine taking that thought from your

mind and throwing it away. You can put it in the trash, or tie it to balloons so it floats away, whatever is helpful. Take a moment to intentionally imagine it leaving.

4. Repeat steps 1 - 3 as needed.

This mental exercise takes practice - the more you do it the easier it will become! As you notice thoughts coming, try not to become angry with yourself. Simply acknowledge their existence and then send them right

The goal of this exercise is to avoid worrying about things you don't need to be worrying about. It is to make you feel more relaxed.

If you begin to notice any particularly troubling thoughts that are recurring or impacting your ability to function, you may want to try talking to a friend or a professional about them. With persistent thoughts or fears this exercise may require some support.

COUNTY ROAD 48 CONSTRUCTION




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


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SNOW WHITE BOMBS FOR THE AGES

In a stunning event, Disney Studio's live action remake of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs (1937), newly titled Snow White was met with atrociously hostile reaction from critics, anger from audiences and out and out hatred for its entitled star Rachel Ziegler. In thirty five years of writing film reviews I cannot recall such a venomous reaction to a film and its star. I was in the audience in 1980 when Heaven's Gate was first shown in Toronto and witnessed the uncomfortable, hushed silence of the audience. Made by an Oscar winning director, for a cost of forty million dollars (huge in 1980), the western was dead on arrival and would bankrupt United Artists studio, founded in the silent era.

Disney will not be bankrupted by Snow White, but their reputation has taken a brutal hit and the career of Rachel Zegler is over just as it began. Disney had been making boatloads of cash remaking their animated classics into live action films often helped A GREAT DEAL by computer generated effects. Lazy? You bet, any originality goes out the door.

It was bad enough they cut "and the Seven Dwarfs" from the title, the company then refused to cast real life little people choosing instead to create their dwarfs with computer generated imagery. Shameful.

It gets worse, much worse. A twenty three year old spoiled child brought the film down.

Miss Rachel Zegler was guilty of arrogance, entitlement and the inability to keep her mouth shut. She publicly bad mouthed the original film, a beloved classic among Disney works and shot her mouth off about the new film. She publicly went to war with her co-star Gal Gadot, famous for her Wonder Woman portrayal and made enemies of Disney executives. To quell her damage, Disney cancelled hundreds of her set interviews and demanded she "shut up". After winning a Golden Globe for Best Actress in the remake of West Side Story (2021), for no less than Steven Spielberg, she angrily attacked the Academy when she did not get an Oscar nomination for the film, causing Spielberg to suggest she show some humility.

Snow White is the biggest bomb in Disney history, bar none. The studio will recover, Miss Ziegler will not. She is career dead, over, dead and buried. Too young for this much success, too arrogant to handle any success she has no one to blame but herself.

Throughout the year, the Norwood and District Horticultural Society offers several opportunities for members and guests to expand their knowledge in horticulture. One such offering is the June 25th bus tour to the Arboretum at the University of Guelph.

The Arboretum is expansive, covering 400 acres adjacent to the university campus, featuring plant collections, gardens, walking trails, natural woodlands, wetlands, and meadows. Established in 1970, the Arboretum is home to more than 1700 different taxa of woody plants, and boosts a strong focus on the conservation of woody plants that are native to Ontario. A guided tour of the Arboretum and lunch in the park will allow the visitor a chance to learn about and embrace the beauty of this spectacular area!

On the return trip to Norwood, there will be a stop at Richters Herbs retail greenhouse. Richters Herbs offers seeds and live plants for both culinary and medicinal uses.

The bus tour is being held on Wednesday, June 25th and will depart from Norwood at 7:30 a.m. and will stop in Peterborough at 8:00 a.m. for others to join. The bus is expected to be back in Norwood around 6:30 p.m. The cost is \$85.00 per person. 

Gaerrisen attended Sir Sanford Fleming college and received a two year CICE (Community Integration through Cooperation education) diploma and was recognized with an individual award praising him for his hard work and dedication.

In 2017 Gaerrisen competed in Winnipeg at the Canadian games. He won Gold for the 100 meters and a Silver for the 200 meters.

Gaerrisen had been training for at least 8 years in the area of snowshoeing. He was set to go to the Olympic Games that were to occur in Russia. Unfortunately due to COVID this did not happen. Sadly at this time his father, Robert Freeland his biggest fan was also diagnosed with stage 4 melanoma cancer and passed before seeing his son reach this milestone.

Gaerrisen joined 1500 athletes from 100 countries in this year's Special Olympic World event held from March 8th to 15th in Sestiere, Italy.

Gaerrisen competed in the 100m, 200m, and 1x400 relay. Gaerrisen did very well winning Gold in all three events.

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RECIPE

ORANGE LOAF

Ingredients:

- ½ cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 eggs
- Rind from 1 orange **
- Juice from 1 orange plus water to make ½ cup **
- 2 cups all purpose flour
- · 2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt

Beat butter, sugar and eggs. Add the dry ingredients and stir until moistened. Turn into a greased loaf pan. Bake at 350 for 1 hour. Test with a toothpick. Pour glaze over the hot loaf top and let cool for 10 minutes before removing.

Glaze:

- Juice from 1 orange
- 1/4 cup white sugar

Combine in a small sauce pan. Heat and stir to dissolve the sugar. Pour over the hot loaf.

I have made this skipping the rind and using orange juice from a bottle.

BUILDING AND PLANNING DEPT.:

Property Standards

The council adopted Property Standards By-law 2024—025 which prescribes standards for the maintenance and occupancy of property within the municipality. It may prohibit the occupancy or use of such property that does not conform to the standards. It requires non-conforming properties to be repaired and maintained to the prescribed standards or to be cleared of all buildings, structures, debris or refuse and left in a graded and levelled condition.

Updated Clean Yards

Council also approved modifications to the Township's Clean Yard By-law to ensure enforcement of property and yard maintenance regulations can be facilitated.

Property Standards Enforcement

The Property Standards By-law, as well as Clean Yards By-law are enforced on a complaint basis, in response to detailed written and signed complaints unless the subject infraction is related to a matter of life safety.
