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BREAKING BARRIERS: PETERBOROUGH HOSTS FLAGSHIP PROGRAM FOR INCLUSION

The City of Peterborough is leading the way and is thrilled to have been chosen to host the 1st "Project SEARCH" in the area! This internationally-recognized internship program is designed to provide students with special needs, both academic and workplace skills and experience; in conjunction with each other. Put simply, the program breaks down barriers to employment by giving students the chance to work in a supportive workplace setting, while at the same time strengthening their academic learning.

Peterborough is proud to be implementing this program for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities, confirming their ongoing commitment to inclusion. This initiative also fulfills the priorities outlined in the 2025-2028 Accessibility Plan; representing a win-win for Peterborough.

They will be working with community partners throughout Peterborough and the Kawarthas. They are partnering with Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington (PVNC) Catholic District School Board, the City of Peterborough and Fleming College's Muskoka-Kawarthas Employment Services. Fleming College is proud to support this worthwhile project and will be working closely with all partners to ensure its success.

Project SEARCH provides students with special education needs, an essential

connection from the classroom to competitive employment. Students will be fully immersed in a real business environment whereby they gain marketable job skills, professional confidence, and real-world experience.

Project SEARCH offers individuals a unique, business-led employment preparation program that takes place entirely at the workplace for one academic year. This facilitates a seamless stream of classroom instruction, career exploration, and hands-on training through worksite rotations. The program concludes with an individualized job search and placement.

As the host organization, Peterborough is offering workplace immersion opportunities for six interns through three rotating placements during the 2025-26 school year. The Ministry of Education has provided funding for this program. Project SEARCH staff are providing ongoing support.

Interns will be working in several City departments, including People and Culture, Children's Services, Environmental Services, Cultural Services, Recreation Services, Peterborough Public Library, Art Gallery of Peterborough, and the Riverview Park and Zoo. And there is more good news: Peterborough Transit will be providing interns with free public transportation during their internship.

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DAVE MILLWARD

Since beginning my writing career with The Rail in early 2022, there have been some stories that have touched my heart and made me happy to tell their story. This is one of those stories.

Dave Millward was one of the first residents at Station Place and at the grand opening he read a poem that he wrote for the occasion. I decided that I really wanted to talk to Dave and find out his story.

So, we sat down in the afternoon of Remembrance Day and talked and talked.

Dave and his late wife Jean were born and raised in Hamilton. They were married at the young age of 18 and that love lasted for 63 years. At the age of 20 or 21 while Dave was in the Navy and on a training session outside of Bermuda on a mine sweeper an accident happened that changed his life forever. The person who was supposed to be attending the boiler room that day was ill and so Dave replaced him. That is a day that he will never forget. The boiler exploded and Dave had burns to both his legs and lost all of his hearing in his left ear. The Navy flew him to Florida and from there an Air Defense plane took him to Toronto to the veteran's hospital known as Sunnybrook. Dave spent around a year there before going home. He said that the love of his wife, child and his faith is what got him through this incredibly hard episode. He was offered another job but this time it was with Air Force where he remained for another seventeen years as an instructor.

After 22 years of serving our country Dave felt it was time to make some decisions so he applied at GM in Oshawa and was hired almost immediately. His wife Jean really didn't like living in Oshawa so after looking around they settled in Peterborough with their teenage son Jim. She said it reminded her of when they lived in eastern Canada. Dave continued to work at GM until his retirement in 1996 to become a full-time caregiver to his wife for the next twenty-five years.

Dave continued to live in Peterborough but because of his hearing loss his mobility was affected. As a veteran he was asked if he wanted to go to the LTC in Sunnybrook and he said NO. His family was here and it just wouldn't work. So, thus begins the next part of his journey. His move to Station Place.

Dave was a lay minister for the Baptist Church and so it was a natural for him to help his new family adjust to their new home. His poem tells it all.

My last words on Dave. What a kind and caring person. It was such a joy to sit and talk with him and as I continue to volunteer there, I hope that we have many more conversations. Perhaps more poems to read. Thank you Dave.

ON THE MOVE

In the first quarter of 2025, approximately 7,342 people moved from Ontario to Alberta. Over the last full year (2023), it is estimated that around 40,000 people made the move from Ontario to Alberta. These figures represent a consistent trend of interprovincial migration from Ontario to Alberta, driven by factors like affordability and economic opportunities.

In the first quarter of 2025, Nova Scotia had a net interprovincial

population gain of 424 people from Ontario. While the exact number for the full year is not yet available, data from previous quarters shows continued migration from Ontario, with the net inflow being 570 people in the final quarter of 2024.



Here's an interesting topic for you to look into... animals and mental health.

Some studies suggest having animals improves your mental health.

Some suggest they can make it worse.

I wonder if it depends on you. Do you enjoy your pet? Do you cuddle and play and go for walks together? Do they make you smile and keep you company? Or do they chew your favourite shoes and pee on your floor? Are they only in the house because a spouse or housemate insisted they get a pet?

If you have a pet that brings you joy, you can tap into that joy during the long winter months. Invite Fido to snuggle up with you while you sip tea or catch the game. Take him for a walk or tell him about your day.

Together create a comfortable routine for the day. These simple acts can help you to feel happier, calmer and more productive. Some say this can reduce your anxiety and depression.

If you have a pet that gets under your skin, this can increase your anxiety and depression. So start exploring boundaries to avoid this. If they are trying to steal your shoe when you just want to relax, give them a safe space where they can't get to your shoe. If the smell of the cat litter from the cat that isn't even yours is getting to you, sit down with the cat's person and come to an agreement on a reasonable schedule for having the litter cleaned up.

So many of us are drawn to having pets around us. The classic question “are you a cat person or a dog person” comes up so often, if you are neither you may find that rather awkward!

This mental health tip is: Let your animals bring you comfort and love; find ways to manage animal behaviours so that they don't bring you unnecessary stress.

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
FOOTE ON FILM

FIVE BEST FILMS OF 2025

- 1. ONE BATTLE AFTER ANOTHER** - Paul Thomas Anderson's masterpiece has dominated the critics awards and will bring home a slew of Oscars. Leonardo di Caprio and Sean Penn are electrifying, Penn terrifying, the entire cast is perfection including newcomer Chase Infiniti. Great on a level of the great films of all time. Revolutionaries past and present go to war with Trump's America.
- 2. SINNERS** - This vampire film is far better than was expected. Vampires come calling one night at a jazz joint owned by two gangster black brothers both played by Michael B. Jordan. The scares come fast and furious and the entire cast is superb with a special shout out to Hailee Steinfeld. Directed by Ryan Coogler who superbly reimagines the vampire film.
- 3. FRANKENSTEIN** -- Benicio Del Toro's remake from the original tale by Mary Shelley is a handsom remounting of the films of the thirties. Beautifully designed and acted with sensitivity by Jacob DElorde as the creature, who at first is a monster but who educates himself to discover from where he came. The scenes in the frozen north, stunning were shot in Toronto. Breathtaking.
- 4. HAMNET** -- Outstanding adaaptation of the best selling novel which explores the writing of Hamlet, Shakespeare's greatest tragedy at a time when he lost his son, which gutted his wife, brilliantly portrayed by Jessie Buckley who seems Oscar bound for her profoundly moving performance. Been many years since I was moved to tears by a film but this one did it.
- 5. SENTIMENTAL VALUE** -- A chamber piece of a film about a father who was a famous stage director trying to re-connect with his daughters who are interested in no such thing. DElle Fanning is a standout as one of the daughters but the film belongs to veteran actor Stellan Skarsgard as the neglectful director.
- 6. TRAIN DREAMS** -- An outstanding Netflix film about a man of the west in the 20th century, who falls into cutting timber for the ever expanding railroad as men conquered the west. Joel Edgerton an underrated actor is superb as the man working at hard labour to feed his wife and young daughter. Beautifully filmed but it is the acting that makes the film and Edgerton and Felicity Jones are Oscar worthy. Haunting and ghostly.
- 7. BUGONIA** -- Strange little film in which Emma Stone again proves why she is among the greatest actresses working in film today. Stone is the curt, cold CEO of a major corporation who is kidnapped by two of her employees who think she is an alien with hostile plans for the earth. Jesse Plemons is the paranoid kidnapper who is convinced she is al alien, The last twenty minutes are original and strange, yet oddly beautiful.
- 8. JAY KELLY** -- In stand out performances, George Clooney is excellent as a major movie star questioning his life and even better is Adam Sandler as his loyal agent and friend who spends more time with the star than his own family, which he is regretting. Directed and written by Noah Baumbach, Clooney is terrific among the other stars but it is Sandler's film.
- 9. MARTY SUPREME** -- It seems Timothee Chalamet will make a return to the Oscar face after nearly winning last year for his work as Bob Dylan in A Complete Unknown (2024) for which he should have won. He might just win for his commanding work here as a man who believes himself to be the greatest ping pong player in the world. Wildly entertaining with Chalamet superb.
- 10. DIE MY LOVE** -- Jennifer Lawrence gives her finest performance here as a woman in the throes of post-partum depression, maybe, lonliness, maybe or utter madness. Living with her partner portrayed by Robert Pattinson they dance, drink, have wild and very franks sex, have a child, grow bored with each other, come back together, all a very wild ride. Lawrence is astounding. Oscar awaits.

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
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FEATURED GUEST SPEAKERS 2026

LIBRARY NEWS



- Council approved the contract with Waste Connections of Canada for waste collection services. .
- Council approved the repairs to the accessible entrance and accessible ramp be awarded to Rivett Architectural Hardware and SRP Electric at a cost of \$18,236.96 and the option for the ceiling repair in the Old Town Hall to be tongue and groove at a cost of \$28,698.19.
- Council directed staff to research the process for how Community Safety Zones are implemented and bring forward a report to a future open session council meeting that details this process.

TRANSPORTATION CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENTS

Economic growth has been stagnating in the current Ontario and Quebec Transportation Corridor and falling behind productivity levels in our fellow G7 countries and the rest of Canada. Increasing transportation costs due to increasing demand and the need for ongoing maintenance are hurting the economy. The current corridor is not equipped to handle increasing congestion due to increased demand and population increases. The existing rail infrastructure does not have the required direct links between communities.

On Tuesday morning the local council received a presentation from ALTO, the crown corporation that is leading a major infrastructure project for a high speed passenger rail system that connects Toronto, Peterborough, Ottawa, Montreal, Trois-Rivieres and Quebec City with dedicated electrified tracks. Related to speeds of up to 300km/hod more are predicted. The tracks will be dedicated to this high speed rail system and avoid delays related to yielding right of ways to freight trains. Travel times from major points are expected to halve when the system is in full use.

Benefits of the system will come from more cooperation from companies in different cities having easier personnel access to each other, more effective workforces because of the ease of travel from home to most beneficial employment opportunities, and improved tourism opportunities.

Some examples of projected time savings include Toronto to Ottawa =2 hours 17 minutes, Toronto to Montreal, =2 hours 23 minutes, Toronto to Peterborough = 47 minutes.

Needless to say, there hasn't been universal agreement in the plan. Smaller communities would be happy with less speed and more destinations. Of course that would mean additional rails or delayed travel time.

Only time will tell what we wind up with. High speed rail systems do not have a universal record of achieving projected promises, however the number of systems built over the last decades provide hopes for a successful end result.

NEW CARBON MONOXIDE LAWS IN ONTARIO:

The new carbon monoxide laws in Ontario, effective January 1, 2026, will significantly expand the installation of carbon monoxide alarms in residential buildings. Here are the key changes:

- **Every Storey:** CO alarms must be installed on every storey of a home, including basements and floors without bedrooms.
- **Adjacent to Sleeping Areas:** Alarms are still required adjacent to every sleeping area, but the obligation now extends to all levels of the home.

Install CO alarms in your home if you have a fuel-burning appliance, a fireplace or an attached garage. Fuel-burning appliances can include furnaces, hot water heaters, gas or wood fireplaces, It's The Law
