

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

ELMER'S EDITORIAL

As we roll into August local garden produce is finding its way onto the shelves of food stores. Ontario food products usually have the green logo with the trillium and the words 'Foodland Ontario'. This logo goes with the jingle: "good things grow in Ontario". The word foodland does not refer to the store by the same name. Farmer's markets and farm stands are great places to acquire healthy locally grown food. Havelock is lucky to have a farmers market that op-erates on Friday afternoons from 1:00 to 6:00 pm along the south side of Hwy 7 in Havelock.

Eating local food from our region or our province is important but eating Canadian is critical to support Canadian farmers. Over 90% of chicken, turkey eggs and dairy products are produced through a system of supply management in Canada. This system produces food for Canadians and does not produce more than Canadians consume. As a result, we are not exporting overproduction into other markets and squeezing farmers in other countries. Our system ensures farmers can predict income and continue farming. Not all of these commodities are labeled as Canadian but as mentioned earlier over 90% and in some cases 100% are products of Canada. The system means supply is maintained and prices are predictable. There are some interest groups who seek to destroy supply management and allow cheap surplus imports which would bankrupt our farmers and we would lose many farmers. Everyone knows what would happen to food prices when Canadian farmers are gone! Check labels on food purchases and "eat Canadian".

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

He was involved in both drama and band which allowed him to find and pursue a passion for the arts. In extracurricular activities, Bob excelled in track and field. His athleticism earned him numerous first place awards at many levels of competition including a chance to compete at OFSAA in relay. He also enjoyed classes in the trades, as they allowed him to build on some of the skills that his father taught him at home. It was at NDHS where a love for computer programming was discovered by Bob.

After graduating from Norwood District High School in 1991, Bob attended Sir Sandford Fleming College from which he graduated with honours with a diploma in Electronics Engineering - Computer Systems program. He later joined one of North America's largest

law firms as a software developer, and advanced to become a senior developer analyst.

It was at this time that Bob connected with his brother, John, to develop their very own software consulting company which they fittingly named RBRO. The company was built to design integrated software products and customized software solutions. RBRO expanded from a home-based company to one with international connections. Offices were established not only in Canada, but also in the US. Australia and the UK.

In 2022, RBRO solutions was sold to Jonas software.

In the world of business, Bob was recognized in 2011 when he won the International Legal Technology Association's consultant of the year award. In 2013, RBRO earned the business excellence award from the Ajax-Pickering Board of Trade. In a partnership with Centennial College, Mr. Russell has mentored students entering his field and participated on the school advisory board.

Bob's success in life is exhibited not only in the area of business, but also in his family life. He has been married to his wife Michelle for almost thirty years, and the couple has raised three daughters together. He is a person who has not forgotten his roots as he has returned to the village of Havelock to build his "forever home" on the land on which he was raised as a young boy. Here, he plans to continue his learning and leadership as he gives back to the local community.

BAILY BAPTIE SCHOOL OF DANCE OPENS IN HAVELOCK

I sat down at the Wildflower Bakery with Baily Baptie to chat about the Baily Baptie School of Dance over coffee. Baily was in grade six when she started dancing at classes in Norwood. Moving forward a few years, she enrolled in the Thomas A. Stewart Integrated Arts Dance Program.

When she was 17 she had the opportunity to teach dance classes in Norwood. In 2015 she took a big step and started teaching on her own. It was just after COVID arrived that she expanded into Havelock. There were a lot of outdoor classes. Baily was able to make arrangements around distancing and preventative measures with the Havelock Centre in 2021. A year later, she was also teaching in Lakefield.

Just recently she had the grand opening of her own studio space in Havelock at 14 Mary Street, across from Woody Burgers. After renting community spaces for the last nine years, the Baily Baptie School of Dance will have its own location, right here in town. Baily is quite excited. "It opens up a lot more opportunity for us, to offer more classes and break classes down by age groups for kids and adults." I asked Baily to describe what she planned to offer this summer. "I will be teaching mainly kids classes from ages, two to 16. Outside of that, I will also do a lot of seniors line dancing and yoga classes." Baily has been doing line dancing classes at the Havelock Seniors Club building on George Street.

August will be a promotional month with five-dollar drop-in classes for everybody who wants to try things out, It begins the second week of August. When I asked Baily what kind of classes she was offering she rolled out the list. "For kids, I do ballet, jazz, contemporary, hip-hop, and tap. For adult classes with the space and being able to offer more classes

because I'm not on a time, restriction I will be offering adult tap classes, ballet, and our line dancing classes as well as yoga.

I asked Baily what the biggest challenges have been for her in the journey from a child dancer to an adult instructor. "It's something that has been a learning experience for me, to make sure that I'm teaching at the right level, with the right types of words, and the right types of actions and learning how to offer more than one type of learning style,"

And the rewards? "Every year, we have a production, and every year the kids are scared but at the end of the show, all the kids leave the stage, and they chat as they come down the stairs off the side of the stage. 'That was awesome. I want to go back. I want to do it again.' So it's always a heartwarming experience to see all of the kids who were so nervous to go on stage come away with that confidence."

Congratulations to Baily Baptie for successfully chasing a dream.

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CARING FOR YOUR ROSES

As the summer days draw forth a bounty of blooms, the roses in your garden also need some special care. Here are some tips for ensuring your roses stay healthy and bloom throughout the summer.

If you have fertilized your roses earlier this summer, that's great! If you have not, you may want to consider adding a small amount of granular fertilizer following the instructions on the package being sure to work it well into the soil and then water. Other options include applying a small amount of water-soluble fertilizer or compost and water well. Following the final application, the rose will ready itself for winter.

Water your roses at the rate of 8 litres per plant once a week (more in hot weather) unless it has rained, preferably applied at ground level and avoid watering during the heat of the day.

Deadhead your roses by carefully pruning spent blooms. If you are pruning a cluster of rose blooms, simply remove the spent bloom so that the other blooms can flourish. A general rule for pruning is to cut just above an outward facing 5-leaflet below the fading bloom ensuring a cane strong enough to support a new bloom or cluster of blooms. With care and attention, you can enjoy your roses throughout the summer and for years to come.

By the way, the Norwood and District Horticultural Society welcomes members and guests back on Tuesday, September 10th for tips on making a beautiful spring bulb garden, presented by Mary Jane Pilgrim (Master Gardener). The meeting will be held at the Royal Canadian Legion in Norwood; doors open at 6:30 pm and the meeting starts at 7:00 pm ~ and, there will be a flower show featuring horticultural specimens, special collections and designs. 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SUCCESS ONLY REQUIRES YEARS OF WORK

In edition 46 of the Havelock Rail, Kathy Clement interviewed Norwood's Elisabeth Rodgers about her book signing at the Belmont Women's Institute in February of 2023. The book signing was in support

of volume #1 of a fantasy trilogy Elisabeth wrote that had just been published. Fast forward to May 11th, 2024 and I learned that Elisabeth was one of the artists participating in this spring's Celebrate Havelock. I checked in with Elisabeth to find out how she was doing and to question her about the writing process. Just how do you get to be a well-reviewed and loved author? I found out a lot in the hour-long chat session that resulted.

When Elisabeth walked into Mrs. Wessel's Creative Writing English class in grade eleven, at Norwood District High School, few would have predicted it would lead to an unbroken string of five-star Amazon reviews for the first two volumes of the "Forsaken" trilogy. But here she is, with the third volume due in November 2025

Elisabeth loved the creative writing class. Mrs. Wessel exposed the students to different exercises to help get their creative juices flowing. She would play a piece of music and ask them "what picture does this music put in your mind?" This was just one of her creative activities for the students.

It was during these classes that Elisabeth's original ideas for the trilogy were born. The image of the land of Remisia slowly evolved the following summer.

I asked Elisabeth about her early attempts to write. She told me "I just loved writing. I had friends in high school and we did these things called To Be Continued. We would write a little paragraph and then put to be continued at the bottom, and then pass it on to each other. It really introduced me to problem-solving as a writer."

While writing her novel she realized there was enough travel in the book that she had better get a map of her imaginary world created to keep directions and distances straight in her mind as she wrote. She found someone who did an excellent job.

Reading about one of her favourite authors introduced her to the concept of maintaining a Character Bible. "You have all your characte descriptions written down." You don't want a character's hair colour to change from red to brown during the writing process.

I asked Elisabeth about character creation. She learned about it from, you guessed it, a book. It suggested that authors should interview their main characters and have an imaginary conversation.

"My main character's name was Marcus so one day I said 'hello Marcus. How are you doing today', and then he responded to me and that kind of got me to know him a little bit. You have to really know the personality of your characters because you're going to throw stuff at them. Before, you know how the character is going to react, you have to know their personality."

Writing a book is one thing, getting it published is something else. In Elisabeth's first attempt to get her novel printed she was offered a traditional publishing contract, but it required her to turn over the rights to her book for the first five years if she signed. She turned it down. She was offered another contract that required her to cover the printing expenses, but the publisher handled the mechanics and distribution and got a percentage. Things have been working out well so far.

Elisabeth does have a Facebook page for her books, and an author page on GoodReads where fans can leave reviews and comments. You can get updates on her work on YouTube. Go to YouTube and search for @Elisabethrodgers. Elisabeth will be attending the farmer's market in Havelock this summer. She hopes to be doing another book reading at the Women's Institute building and will also have a booth at the Peterborough Comicon on September 21st at The Venue on George Street. Congratulations to her for her success so far.

"ALGAE BLOOM": IS IT A PROBLEM?

With the increase in renters; it's time to alert and remind them of the love you have for your lake and that the water should be respected. I love to swim and swimming in Belmont Lake is so tranquil and relaxing. But this year I have noticed an increased presence of what I believe to be "algae bloom" spreading rapidly in our lake. These blooms are sinewy and gross to swim through. It is recognizable by the discolouration in the water as it actually looks like green-blue blobs. They are not only growing but they are breaking up in the water to create more blooms. These blooms contain toxins which can sometimes cause skin irritations.

Basically, algae thrive where there is an abundance of two nutrients: phosphorous and nitrogen; caused by, but not limited to, sewage, fertilizers and detergents. As well, extreme heat and excessive rain flow contribute to the spread; and, as you know, we have experienced both in the past few years. When the algae die they sink to the bottom and decompose. During this decomposition, bacteria consume oxygen. As oxygen decreases, fish and other aquatic animals may suffocate; and they in turn decompose which depletes more oxygen; a vicious uncontrollable cycle. We now

have a competition for oxygen between our aquatic friends and bloom algae. Swimming, fishing and enjoying our lake's many activities will be detrimentally affected. We must be responsible lake occupants.



RECIPE

STRAWBERRY JAM

INGREDIENTS

- 2 pounds of strawberries
- 4 cups granulated sugar
- 1 package pectin
- 3 teaspoons lemon juice



Trim and wash the berries. Cut into small pieces and mix with lemon juice and sugar. Refrigerate for a few hours. Stir well and add 1 pkg of pectin. Cook over medium low heat. Make sure the sugar and pectin all dissolve. Bring to a boil (220 degrees).

Remove from the heat and skim away any scum on the surface. Ladle the jam into sterilized hot jars. Jam can be stored in air tight jars in the refrigerator for 1 month or it can be kept in the freezer for 6 months.

Meeting held on July 16, 2024.

- Terry Rees delegation Re: Ward System. He is a seasonal resident of HBM Township who lives on Kasshabog Lake. He is encouraging people to become involved and aware of what our municipal government is doing. He is in favour of dissolving the ward system. He suggested that we vote for 3 or 4 councillors and that council decide who would be the best person to be the Deputy Mayor. This was also basically the same message that past Deputy Mayor Gerow conveyed to council.
- Treasurer Lionel Towns, Re: Operating Budget. He asked that council consider a 1% tax levy increase in 2025. Councillor Dorherty immediately jumped and stated "this is an operating budget based on the needs, not percentage points." Motion made and Passed defeating this idea.
- Lionel Towns, Treasurer informed the council of Canada Community Building Fund formerly the Gas Tax rebate.
- Bob Angione CAO/Clerk Re George Street Construction. QBT has been awarded the contract for reconstruction of George Street. He informed council that the hookups to sewers for groundwater similar to what was done on Mathison St., King St., and Donald which was paid for by the municipality. The approximate cost will now be \$5,800 per household. Lengthy discussion into whether HBM pays or they split with the homeowner to cover cost. Mayor Martin stated we should be looking to see if there is grant money available. Motion made that it will be mandatory and covered completely by the landowner.
- Bob Angione CAO/Clerk Re: Heritage Committee. He spoke about terms of reference. He suggested that a committee be formed and a council member be on said committee. Lengthy discussion about Belmont Methuen Historical committee ensued. Suggestion was made that they be invited to the next meeting.
- Letter received from Cheryl Levesque from Havelock Minor Softball requesting funding to attend a tournament that costs \$100.00 per person for a team of 13 young men which would pay for the lodging and their meals for all the ball team. After a lengthy discussion Council agreed that the monies received from the Bottle Drive at 6th Line transfer station for July and August will be donated to Minor Softball with the understanding they look after the area.
