ELMER'S EDITORIAL

Beans beans the musical fruit

The more you eat the more you toot! So eat beans beans for every meal!

This is a rhyme I remember from early days at the North School. It was not unusual to have a 'farting contest' after which the winner often confessed to consuming baked beans the previous day.

Prepared beans from a can may be popular (check this months recipe) but preparing baked beans from scratch is making a resurgence on cooking shows and is in the diet of many

As we shift away from red meat, a variety of beans have made their way to our dinner table. While baked beans may have been a staple diet item in my youth, I never heard of hummus or any of the 400 different types or varieties of beans that are grown across the globe. Humans have been cultivating these different varieties of dry beans for millennia. They required no special conditions for storage other than protection from rodents.

Over 1000 farmers in Ontario grow nine different types of dry beans and export 80-90% of production. The white pea bean is the most popular with the bulk of exports going to the Heinz plant in England.

For a variety of reasons, the consumption of red meat continues to decline and beans, lentils pulses etc are increasingly a source of protein in our diet.

Most cooks know how to cook beans by rinsing several times in order to reduce the gaseous effect of beans. Go ahead enjoy a toot!

COMMUNITY HEALTH OUTREACH

The other day when I was at Community Care I picked up a flyer with the heading "Community Health Care is coming to Havelock". That evening there was a

short clip on CHEX news announcing this new program. Very interesting. It required a Google search for more info.

There is indeed a new donor-funded Community Health Outreach, coordinated between Trent University and Peterborough Community Health Centre (PCHC). Community Care Havelock is hosting this program at the office on Smith Drive. The service is designed to be used by persons who do not have a Healthcare provider. This is the first year of the trial project designed to improve access to health care for residents of Havelock and

other rural areas. The purpose of this program is to provide primary care services to rural and indigenous communities in Peterborough County. A Nurse Practitioner leads the team and supports and supervises a group of up to 8 student nurses each semester from Trent's nursing program. As everybody knows, folks who don't have a Doctor can be affected by long waits at walk in clinics or emergency rooms for routine non-emergency health issues.

This program operates two days per month and will be available at 17 Smith Drive in Havelock every other Thursday from 10:00 to 2:00. The Nurse Practitioner and nursing students will provide hands on healthcare for acute and chronic conditions and offer well-child visits, harm reduction supplies, safer sex supplies and education.

If this program sounds like something that may be of benefit to you and your family, give it a try. The next clinic is on November 13 from 10 to 2:00.



The annal Community Care Toonie Auction that is. The upgrades and renovations at the HBM Community Centre are moving ahead but will not be ready in time for the Auction. Instead, the Auction will be held at the Legion on Ottawa Street on Thursday, December 4. Doors will open at 9:30 and the auction starts at 10:00 am. Ticket price of \$20 includes admission and a hot lunch. The Legion ladies and gents will cater for the event.

If you are familiar with the Legion facility you will think "How the heck is that going to work?" The room is much smaller so sharing the space between auction items and tables for lunch will not work. Well, the organizing committee and staff tell me that they have a plan.

As always, the generous community businesses and groups are the auction item donors - some small and some larger. There will be room for many of the smaller items at the legion on the day of the auction. The larger items will be on display in the Community Care Board Room starting one week before the auction. Bidding will only be accepted on Auction Day. There will be a colour catalogue available on Auction Day and work is being done to put together a video display so that bidders can view a picture of the items

up for auction in real time.

Toonie Auction supporters know one of the reasons they show up each year, it is really fun and it is possible that you may end up talking home a new treasure. This is the 20th anniversary of the Auction. All the proceeds are in support of the programs that are available through Community Care Havelock. Likely the most visible program is the New To You store at 17 Smith Drive. The store offers a wealth of donated secondhand items chosen. and tastefully displayed by the welcoming volunteers who man the shop. Although not so visible, the core programs offered service to 339 clients last year. Services included: 3908 reassurance calls; 3722 economical hot and frozen meals delivered; 2668 drives for appointments and shopping trips; 7854 exercise and fall prevention classes and 527 home help and maintenance visits. All services are coordinated by 2 full time staff and 9906 hours of service by 72 volunteers (2024).


Jermaine came to Canada over twenty years ago and worked as a certified PSW at Princess Margaret Hospital in Toronto for ten years. Then he decided to move on to EnerCare as an administrative assistant where he remained for four years. Then in 2021 he opened King's Reliable Used Cars. He opened his shop in Havelock and at the same time decided to help a friend out by doing a Jamaican Jerk BBQ as part of a fundraiser.

That was a success and he was back to doing what he loves. Cooking and feeding people!

In 2024 Jermaine brought his talents to the local Havelock Farmers Market with the first ever Jamaican food service. Along to the tunes of Bob Marley people could enjoy jerk chicken with rice and peas. Then in the 2025 season that Jamaican menu expanded to curried goat, jerk pork and jerk salmon and more.

Jermaine has a real following of lovers of his food and with the word of mouth praises he became a hit. So much so that a representative of TIFF came to Havelock, tasted his food and asked him to showcase his skills at the food pavilions at TIFF. In one day, he fed well over 500 people jerk chicken, mac and cheese and rice and beans. At the same time, he was cooking and feeding people, some actors from the show called POWER gathered around his booth and ended up doing photo ops. He said that he loved seeing the joy of people eating authentic Jamaican cuisine.

A very exciting day for a local chef. I asked Jermaine what he had to say about his day and his response was "Don't ever be shy to try new things. You never know until you try it".

MENTAL HEALTH TIP

I recently found myself in conversation with a friend discussing "what is mental health?" and "Can we do anything to change it?". My answer to the latter is a resounding yes.

What is mental health? It is simply how you are feeling and coping day-to-day. We all have good and bad days, We all have stressors in our lives. These things are never going to change. So what can we do to change our mental health, aside from waiting for life to be easier?

If you are wondering what you can do to improve your mental health, consider what is within your power to change. There is a popular tool called "the circle of control". To use this you imagine a circle (or you can actually draw one, if you prefer). And in this circle you put things, mentally or by writing/drawing, that you can control. Examples might be how you speak to your family, how you react when things are stressful, or how you care for yourself (food, exercise, etc.). There are many

things that could go into your circle. Need help? Use technology such as Google, ChatGPT or call up a friend to brainstorm.

Then consider what is outside of your circle. You can't control your boss or neighbour. You can't control the cost of fuel or many living expenses. Again, use whatever resources you like to add to the list of things that you simply cannot control.

Now look at your circle of control. Look to see what may be within your control AND causing you stress. This is a great starting point to improving your mental health. These things should rely solely on you; the changes should not be contingent on your spouse or your children changing, they should be changes you can carry out all on your own. They may open the door to more healthy relationships and a calmer home but the change must start with you.



AWARDS SEASON BEGINS PART I

The long slog through awards season culminating in the awarding of the Academy Awards in March has officially begun. We can thank imprisoned Harvey Weinstein for the campaign season and its length but the fact is all the studios do it and there are a host of major awards given before the Oscars. The New York Film Critics and Los Angeles Film Critics are enormously important then the Golden Globe Awards which Warren Beatty once described as "fun. while the Oscars are serious business." The many guild awards are next, the Screen Actors Guild, the Directors Guild and the Producers Guild are all given before the Oscars are handed out. It is often an Oscar nomination is more important than the award itself and many stars believe that.

Do not expect to see Snow White among the nominees...ugh. Never has Disney Studios had such a negative year.

This year as of October some of the frontrunners have been seen. There seems nothing that can stop Paul Thomas Andersson's masterpiece One Battle After Another, a soaring film that should take home several awards including a long overdue Oscar for its gifted director-writer. Nominations should come to Leonardo Di Caprio and Sean Penn as well, and it seems a lock for Best Picture. The thrilling vampire horror film Sinners with its largely black cast is a spin on the genre and a damned good one. It builds slowly before un; eashing its horrors, and is beautifully acted and director. Ryan Coogler should nab a Best Director nmiation and star Michael B. Jordan should be in the running for Best Actor, with Hailie Stenfield a possible Supporting Actress nominee.

Academy Award winning Best Director Chloe Zhao marks a return to filmmaking with Hamnet, her adaptation of the best selling book about William Shakespeare's son. It won the People's Choice Award during TIFF making it a shoo in for a Best Picture nomination.

The first woman to ever win the Best Director Oscar Kathryn Bigelow returns with a high octane White House thriller that seems likely for includison into the race. A House Full of Dynamite premiered at Venice to rave reviews and predictions of Oscar glory. Anything Bigelow has directed has been excellent so I will be there awaiting this anxiously.

Wicked - For Good completezs the Wicked story, with both Cynthis Ervio and Ariana Grande back with their stunning Oz prequel. Count on more Oscar glory and many nominations for this film.

The Bruce Springsteen biography about the making of his acoustic Nebraska album Springsteen: Deliver Me from Nowhere seems a likely nominee and actor Jeremy Allen White is being discussed as a potential Best Actor winner.

Expect nominations for both George Clooney (Actor) and Adam Sandler (Supporting Actor) in the Noah Baumbach movie Jay Kelly for Netflix and Timothee Chalamet who should have won Best Actor last year for his super Bob Dylan performance in A Complete Unknown is back in Marty Supreme likely going for more Oscar glory.

PLANTING TULIPS FOR SPRING COLOUR

Tulips have long been a favorite among gardens for adding an early splash of colour to their gardens. Planting them in the fall, when the evening temperature is between 4°C and 10°C, is the perfect time to ensure the bulbs go through a dormant period that will trigger them to bloom in the spring.

Tulips thrive in fertile, well-drained soil in sun and with shelter. With their strong, vertical stems and interesting bloom shapes, they provide height, structure and stunning colour to beds and borders.

When planting tulips be sure to bury them to a depth that matches 3 times the height of the bulb (which is about 6 to 8 inches) and about 4 to 6 inches apart. Be sure to plant them pointed side up! Bit if you happen to plant the bulb on its side, it will adjust and grow straight to ward the soil surface.

To protect them from wildlife – squirrels in particular – you can cover the area with chicken wire. Some have also had success protecting them by spreading pelleted chicken manure over the soil. Be sure not to use bone meal when planting bulbs because the bone meal is actually an attractant and you may find your bulbs have been dug up.

By the way, the next meeting of the Norwood and District Horticultural Society will be held on Tuesday, November 11th at the Royal Canadian Legion in Norwood. It will be our Annual Meeting and will feature a seasonal design demonstration by Lezlie Miller, and photography show and tell. For more details be sure to follow us on Facebook.



RECIPE

SLOW COOKER BEAN SOUP

By Kathy Clement

Ingredients:

- · 2 cans mixed beans (drained and rinsed)
- 4 cups vegetable broth
- 1 cup diced tomatoes (I used a can)
- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 2 cloves garlic minced
- 1 tsp smoked paprika (or plain)
- 1 tsp cumin
- · 1 tsp dried oregano
- Salt & pepper to taste



Add everything together in your slow cooker. Cook on low 6-8 hours or on high 3-4 hours.

**Note. I did make it in a soup on top of the stove and just let it simmer for a couple of hours.

If you want to change it up, substitute chicken broth and add a pound of ground chicken browned. Or, substitute beef broth and add a pound of ground beef browned.



Five Of Faller

HAVELOCK, Nov. 13 — (ENS).

—Not for some years has such a large number gathered at the Memorial Gates for a Remembrance Day service as did this week to pay their fourth wartime tribute.

A parade of the school pupils and teachers was headed by the Air Cadet Squadron No. 149. Rever E. W. Seeney, chairman, paid a tribute to those who had pa'd the supreme sacrifice. The following sociities were represented and placed memorial wreaths at the gates; Province of Ontario, place by Mrs. Avery; War Veterams, by Harold Matheson; Village Council, by A. Sanderson; United Church by Mrs. J. W. Wilkinson; Church by Mrs. J. W. Wilkinson; Fastern Star, by Mrs. Chree; Home and School, by Miss N. Watson; Eastern Star, by Mrs. George Hubbell; Dorcas Rebesahs, Mrs. J. Diaper; Masonic Order, by Everett Chiles and the

Senools by Principal Jones.

Special tribute was paid to the five local men who fell in the present conflict, when five small white wooden crosses, each bearing a name plate or the departed soldier was placed in front of the flags by Veterans. They were F.O. Keith Pollock, Sgt. Foster Keene, Pt. Johnston, Pte. Tice Post, Pte. Charles Haggerty.



Enlisting with the H.P.E. Regiment in September, 1939, Opl. Currie has been overseas since January of 1941. He received his medal at Dieppe when he carried a Cornwail officer who had had both legs shot off, to safety. At this time he suffered severe shrapnel wounds in the hip and back, also a broken arm, and was in hospital for eight months. He talked to the late Charles Haggerty of Havelock 10 minutes before the zero hour at Dieppe.
