To the editor:

Last month I may have been identified accidentally as the author of "Desiderata". As much as I love the words, I certainly am not the author. Desiderata (which means "things to be desired") has an interesting history. Many believe that it originated at Old St. Paul's Church, Baltimore A.C. 1692.

This is a misunderstanding which arose in the late 1950s. At that time, the head of an historic old church in Baltimore printed up the established prose poem for his congregation. He added the name of his church, Old St. Paul's, at the bottom along with the year 1692. But that was merely the year of the founding of the church itself.

Instead, the accepted origin is that Desiderata was penned prior to World War II by Indiana poet/lawyer Max Ehrmann. He sent it out as a Christmas card. Later, hundreds of copies were circulated by a wartime doctor to patients and soldiers. The poem was eventually popularized by writers, performers, activists, politicians, and especially poster-makers. Its beautiful sentiments have touched many people. A copy hangs on a wall in our home.


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SIP OUTSIDE OF THE BOX: 5 FESTIVE WINES THAT REDEFINE HOLIDAY CHEER

This holiday season we are venturing beyond the popular Cabernet Sauvignon and Pinot Grigio go-tos to sip outside of the box. Look for these affordable and expert-approved bottles to elevate your festive food pairings and family gatherings.

SPARKLING REDS

Sparkling red wines are making a comeback, and for good reason! This isn't your grandmother's Lambrusco - the sparkling reds we see on shelves today aren't overpowered by sugar, they are well-balanced and are much higher in quality. These bubbles are trending because they're unique, food-friendly, and most importantly - fun!

Try: Riunite Lambrusco Reggiano 1950 Amabile, LCBO #43952, \$14.40

CHENIN BLANC

Stop bringing the same boring white wine to dinner, instead, open a bottle of Chenin Blanc. This is a medium-bodied white wine that exudes freshness and style and can easily punch above its' price point. Chenin is so versatile and can be made dry or sweet, still or bubbles. Although it's known as South Africa's signature white grape, bottles can also be found from Ontario, Argentina and the Loire Valley in France (e.g. Vouvray).

Try: Roberston Winery Chenin Blanc, LCBO #495507, \$11.95

FRIENDLY RED BLENDS

Red blends are a road to harmony and intrigue in the glass. They offer an honest insight into the winemaker's vision for expressing their region and terroir thru their craft. Friendly red blends can be more approachable to a wider crowd, and easier to pair with festive dishes on the table. Forego

a classic cab/merlot blend and look for wines with a livelier profile, like a Sangiovese and Syrah mash-up.

Try: SASYR, LCBO #43948, \$15.95

TEMPRANILLO

Ready for a red that's sure to be a crowd-pleaser? No need to tell the meat-lovers, but this specific bottle is an organic, vegan-friendly, unoaked Tempranillo that boasts bright red cherry and licorice aromas from the glass. It exudes fresh, red fruit notes on the forefront of a medium-bodied palate that quickly evolves with a complex oomph of savoury dried herbs and subtle woodsy flavours. This wine guarantees to appease both light and heavy red drinkers and will accompany turkey, dressing, and root veggies nicely.

Try: Mesta Organic Tempranillo, LCBO # 44591, \$10.80

WHITE PORT COCKTAILS

If you think you know Port, think again. Another wine style that's making a comeback and especially as a cocktail base. White Port makes a smart, lower-alcohol substitute ringing in at only 20%abv. A chameleon for cocktails, it adds a subtle and tasty component for easy-to-make drinks this season. All you need is 1.5oz of White Port, ice, and your favourite soda water. Amp up the festiveness by throwing in some frozen cranberries and a sprig of thyme.

Try: Fonseca White Port, LCBO #276816, \$19.45

Looking to the future needs of our growing regional community and aging population, PRHC plans to:


- expand cardiac care, including treatments never before offered in the region;



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OSCAR PREDICTIONS 3 -- BEST ACTOR

In my opinion the Oscar for Best Actor last year should have gone to Timothee Chalamet for his stunning performance as folk legend Bob Dylan in A Complete Unknown (2024). The young actor embodied Dylan in every way, doing his own singing, guitar paying and the playing of the harmonica. He brought to the screen Dylan's rumpled genius, his songs the poetry of a generation in rapid changing times. His songs became the antheem for the youth of America and Chalamet brought the soul of the artist to the screen. He will be back again this year, and likely many more with his performance as the hyperactive Marty Supreme. It is being called the performance of his career, and might be, which will see him nominated again for Best Actor.

Alongside him will be previous winners Leonardo Di Caprio as the revolutionary in One Battle After Another, George Clooney in Jay Kelly, and three time Best Actor winner Daniel Day-Lewis is a long shot for his son's directed film Anemone, which has earned acclaim in film festivels.

Emmy winner Jeremy Allen White is a potential nominee for his performance as Bruce Springsteen in Springsteen -- Deliver Me From Nowhere and has earned rave reviews in the early screenings. The Boss himself had great praise for the young actor in the film, a study of how he came to create his acclaimed acoustic album Nebraska.

Jesse Plemons is a potential nominee for his fine performance in Bulgaria, making him a potential nominee. Oscar Isaac could nab a nomination for his powerful work in Del Toro's Frankenstein, a marvelous looking remake and in the other major horror film Michael B. Jordan could be a nominee for his work as twins in Sinners. I expect multiple nominations for Sinners, a hugely succesful film that puts clever spin on the vampire film.

In all it has been a fine year for performance and the four acting categories will be filled with outstanding, for the ages work.

In the supporting categry Jacob Elordi is a revelation as the monster in Frankenstein. but he goes against Sean Penn as the danngerously, surly cop in One Battle After Another, and Adam Sandler as the agent in Jay Kelly.

Looking for his first ever nomination at 72 is Stelland Skarsgard in Sentimental Voices a huge critical hit with critics. Watch for Sinners to grab a nod for Delroy Lindo as well. Going to be a fun ride.

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

IT'S TIME TO HANG THE CHRISTMAS WREATH

For many people, placing a wreath on the front door of the home at Christmas time is part of the annual festive decoration. It's a tradition that predates Christmas itself—a symbol that has evolved from ancient rituals to modern celebration.

Wreaths were worn to signify honor and victory, rejuvenation, renewal. The wreath became a part of the celebrations of the winter solstice symbolising life and resilience during the harsh winter months. The circular shape of the wreath symbolises immortality and the idea of everlasting life.

Today, the Christmas wreath has become one of the most recognisable symbols of the season, adorning doors, mantels, and city streets and continues to reflect its original symbolism.

Every wreath starts with a circular base made of wire, straw, grapevine, or floral foam and is wrapped with bunches of plant material. Fresh

evergreens, like pine, cedar and spruce represent resilience and eternal life; holly and ivy symbolise protection and faith; and pinecones and berries evoke renewal. The plant materials (a mix of different types) are wrapped together in small bunches and attached to the base with floral wire. The bunches should be about six inches in length. Overlapping the bunches will hide the stems as more bunches are added to the wreath. To add more interest, include herbs like rosemary and summer savory, cones, and dried flowers. Don't forget the bow which expresses unity and generosity!

Hanging a wreath is both an act of decoration and a gesture of hospitality—a quiet invitation to share in the joy of the season.

This month, more resources are wasted. 'Trashing' food is one of them! Instead, embrace 'leftovers' or utilize our transfer station's composting system. Backyard composting or vermicomposting with red wigglers is another option. Red wigglers reside in an opaque bin with holes for air and drainage. In their 'sea' of damp cellulose bedding that covers the worms and food, they transform both bedding and veggie/fruit peelings into nitrogen-rich castings.

HONOURING MEMORIES PLANTING DREAMS

Honouring memories, Planting dreams, is an initiative that invites individuals and organizations to join in reconciliation by planting Heart Gardens in their communities. Heart Gardens honour Residential School survivors and their families. Each heart represents the memory of a child lost to the residential school system. The act of planting represents an individual's commitment to finding their place in reconciliation.

Hearts are made by anyone of all ages and backgrounds. Before getting hands dirty, students take the opportunity to learn about the history of residential schools and their ongoing impacts. There are currently 10 schools within the Kawartha Pine Ridge Board that have participated in the Honouring memories Planting Dreams Heart Garden project. Each school year, the KPR Indigenous Education Department selects a few schools to receive Heart Gardens.

Once schools have been selected, a member from the Indigenous Education Department Works in partnership with the school teams to plan learning opportunities leading up to the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation on September 30th. The Indigenous Education Department member also works in partnership with Alderville Black Oak Savannah to prepare for planting day, which takes place every school year in the fall.

This year, Havelock Belmont Public School was chosen based on their ongoing commitment to Truth and Reconciliation. 20 Native species were planted in honor and memory of the children.


EASY HAMBURGS

**do not grease the dish or cover when baking.


COLOURING CONTEST

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - TUESDAY, OCTOBER 21, 2025

- Council deferred the Zoning By-law Amendment for Venema (524 FR 54).
- Council approved Zoning By-law Amendments for Sampson (431 FR 93) and Rye (65 FR 94) and Minor Variance Applications for Lobbezoo (196 FR 87A) and Crook (417 Blairton Road).
- The Township endorsed the application for consent to sever lands for a lot addition as referenced as Application B-77-25 (Deshane).
- Council approved the Community Grant Application from the Cordova Mines Recreation Association.
- Council approved the 2025-2026 Winter Maintenance Agreement with Emcom Services Inc. in the amount of \$31,765.58.
- Council members provided their budget priorities to be discussed during the 2026 budget deliberations.
- The request from Jude Thompson for the placement of a little book library on Township property was approved.
- Council approved immediate repairs to the Old Town Hall for attic abatement and insulation and repairs to the mezzanine railing system.

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 4, 2025

- The presentation from Marina Sheridan from Harbr Human Resources regarding the Council Compensation Review was received for information.
- Council received the staff reports for information: 2025 Q3 Update on Capital Projects and Economic Development & Tourism Strategic Plan Status Review.
- Council approved staff to proceed with the submission of a grant application for the Connecting Links for the installation of battery back up traffic light power, CCTV of existing sanitary and storm infrastructure, identifying and repairing deficiencies and remove and replacement of surface asphalt within the Highway #7 Connecting Link.
- Mayor Martin indicated that he would like to have a location for the Medical Centre determined by the end of 2025.

FIRE SAFETY:

KEEP FIRE SAFETY IN MIND AS TEMPERATURES DROP!

Havelock-Belmont-Methuen Fire & Emergency Services is urging everyone to keep fire safety in mind as the temperatures turn colder.

We often see more home fires during the winter months due to heating equipment and appliances, pay close attention to potential fire hazards such as fireplaces, furnaces, chimneys and vents, and space heaters.

There are some simple things people can do to stay fire safe during the colder months:

- Have all fuel-burning appliances inspected annually by a registered fuel contractor.
- Keep chimneys and intake/exhaust vents for furnaces and heating appliances free of debris, ice and snow accumulations to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide (CO) build-up from inefficient combustion.
- Burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves to reduce the risk of excessive creosote build-up in chimneys.
- Allow ashes from your fireplace or woodstove to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep the container outside.
- Keep space heaters at least one meter (3 feet) away from anything that can burn, including curtains, upholstery and clothing.
- Replace worn or damaged electrical wires and connections on vehicles and extension cords and use the proper gauge extension cord for vehicle block heaters.
- Consider using approved timers for vehicle block heaters rather than leaving heaters on all night.
- Ensure that vehicles are not left running inside any garage or building.
- Ensure there is a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas of your home.
- Install CO alarms outside all sleeping areas to alert you to the presence of this deadly gas.
