MOVING DAY

The place is called Station Place. The first residents will be moving on September 2, 2025.

Most readers will know the history: briefly:

- The dream began ????
- Land was purchased 2011
- Projected announcement by Province 2018
- AON announced as developer 2022
- Groundbreaking 2023
- Opening soon

We moved here a little over 19 years ago and I think that it was shortly afterwards that I started hearing about Long Term Care (LTC) coming to Havelock – at least the desire for that to happen. Fast forward to today.

AON/Station Place has been advertising for staff and offering a connection to PSW training to help in the hiring of up to 170 full-time and

part-time staff needed for the operation of a 128 bed LTC home. All staff must undergo a Police Check with Vulnerable Sector Screening. Staff will receive training specific to Station Place through an intensive orientation. Training updates on up to 24 topics will be conducted annually. AON has tried and true experience in operating LTC homes in many communities around the province. They are a family-owned company which values family ownership with a view to the long term and the provision of excellent service to the community.

Station Place is funded by the Ministry of Long-Term Care. The Ministry conducts several inspections each year including an inspection that reaches out for Resident input with respect to quality of care. Station Place is required to submit a long list of reports to the Ministry each month with upwards of two dozen indicators that make up the report.

Starion Place is made of 4 self-contained "Home Areas' housing 32 residents in each. One Home area is dedicated to dementia-care. The individual Home Areas have private dining areas serviced by a small kitchen which is linked to the main floor kitchen. In addition, all residents have access to places of worship, therapy rooms, hair dressing salon, gazebo and self-contained secure courtyard.

If the time has come for long-term care, Station Place is certainly a beautiful place to start your search. To speak with a Care Coordinator about getting on the wait list for Station Place call 1-800-263-3877.

ELMER'S EDITORIAL

As the US - Canada trade war rages on, we are going to hear more about milk. The American President and several of the large producing enterprises want to ship milk into our market. Many of their production units have over a thousand cows. A recent article I read described a farm in Pennsylvania with 1875 milking cows and 20,000 chickens along with 475 employees. Not exactly a family farm! Most of our dairy farms have the whole family and maybe one or two employees earn a decent living without off farm income.

Our farms producing milk, chicken, eggs, and turkeys have survived because we have what is known as supply management. In a nut shell, we produce enough for the Canadian market and do not try to export. This means that each farm group sits down on a regular basis with government oversight to decide on cost of production and the amount of production for each quota period based on anticipated consumption. Production is spread across Canadian farmers who purchase quota and maintain a cap on production. This process allows for production to meet market demand and keep consumer prices stable. For example significantly more chicken is produced during super bowl weekend because tons of chicken wings are consumed on that weekend. We do not have huge fluctuations in prices. In order for supply management to work we need import controls or significant tariffs to keep U.S.A and other imports out.

However, if we throw open the gates to the American mega enterprises with several thousand dairy cows and literally millions of chickens, our family farms will be wiped out along with many thousands of jobs in the agri-food industry. Most of the farms producing beef, pork, lamb, and vegetables have at least one family member working off the farm in order to maintain their passion for farming. Our true family farms are important to our future food security and should not be sacrificed to please a bully American President.

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
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KEN PRESCOTT, UNIQUE ARTIST, AT THE BELMONT STONE HALL THIS AUGUST

Ken was born in London, Ontario and after graduation worked as an advertising designer, art director and freelance graphic designer while travelling throughout the world.

HERE'S TO GOOD HEALTH

Health Care is certainly going through a lot of change. In this day and age, a common complaint is that health care is not always as we would like it to be.

I am happy to be telling my personal experience that could not have been better I am thankfully almost back to normal 9 weeks after surgery. My whole point in telling my story is to give a huge shout out to the professionals who gave me such great care;

the Nurse Practitioner who made the first referral the diagnostic staff at Campbellford Hospital the Peterborough Urologist who referred me to the Peterborough Vascular surgeon and, of course all the surgery ICU nurses at PRHC

- They certainly deserve a lot of credit – I am not a very patient patient!

In early April I was scheduled for an ultrasound to "see" what was happening in my mid-section (an older man thing). The Doctor I had seen

called to tell me that issue that concerned him was not that bad and was quite treatable. He went to ask if I knew about the aneurysm in my lower right abdomen. Of course I said no and asked him for a referral to a doctor who dealt with this sort of thing. In less than a week I had an appointment with a vascular surgeon for the following week. Within a week and half after seeing the surgeon who explained the seriousness of the situation, I had an appointment for surgery in early May. Apparently the situation in my abdomen was indeed life threatening if left untreated. After a 4 or 5 hour surgery which opened my abdomen (about 9 inch incision) and the appropriate repairs were made, and I spent the next 5 days in surgery intensive care. After going home, I had stringent restrictions limiting what I could not do to ensure proper healing.

As I stated at the outset, I am almost back to normal and have the utmost respect and thanks to all the medical professionals that I encountered and, again, my apologies to ICU Nurses to whom I may have been a pain in the butt.



This month's tip is so simple, it may feel obvious, but I want to state it in case it has never occurred to you that this could be a real strategy! The other thing about this strategy is that it can go wrong and make things worse (even though initially it may feel like a good option). So read on to find out how to use this strategy in a way that is helpful and constructive.

Talk to somebody.

DO: Talk to a friend. Talk to a colleague. Talk to a neighbour. A professional. Somebody. Anybody who feels like a safe confidante.

DON'T: Talk to somebody who is prone to gossip. Don't talk to somebody who tends to belittle you or your problems. Don't talk to somebody who might get angry or upset about what you are about to share.

DO: Let out those thoughts, feelings, and fears. It can make them feel less heavy.

DON'T: Ignore your feelings. The temptation is to stuff down your problems, stuff down any unpleasantness. But then it stays with you.

DO: Talk to somebody who is helpful and supportive. Someone who isn't quick to judge or isn't prone to negativity. Find somebody who will not be dismissive of you or give you a hard time about whatever you want to say. Somebody who can keep what you share between the two of you.

DON'T: Talk to somebody you don't trust.

DO: Give yourself 10-15 minutes to vent - to express your problems. Get those things you want to hide a way inside out! Then shut it down.

DON'T: Spend the rest of your day obsessing on this. Don't let your entire visit be centred around this problem.

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

I have always admired and enjoyed driving past a particular house on George St. East close to Mary St. Little red wagons filled with flowers surrounding the cutest chuck wagon ever! Also to be admired are some planes. Everything is homemade and built by John Marten.

I finally got up my courage, stopped and asked John if I could do an article on his yard and his wagons. Today I sat down with John and his wife Terri and had a fabulous conversation about their lives, their home here in Havelock and John's hobby.

John is actually from Havelock and left here as a young man to go North. And I mean north. He first went for a couple of months and then in 1979 he left and didn't come back for forty years.

John moved to Norman Wells NWT which is approximately 90 miles south of the Artic Circle. I told you he moved north! The town is known as an oil town and is historically significant for its oil field discovery and production. John worked as a subcontractor to Imperial Oil. John also worked on the ice roads, operated large machinery, etc. I could write a story just on his livelihood. John met his wife Terri there and after retiring in 2018 they came to Havelock. Home for John and a very new life for Terri. She doesn't miss the -45 and lower winter degrees.

Upon retirement John knew he had to do something. He bought the first small chuck wagon from a local fellow for \$100.00 and did manual labour for this gentleman to pay for his lumber. In 2019 John started on his journey of making wagons and eventually airplanes. He usually uses rough pine or spruce wood. The wagons take a minimum of a week.

John traded 2 wagons for enough wood to make 8 more. He also wants to complete a couple more planes. That should keep him busy this winter.

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EXTENDING YOUR GARDEN BOUNTY

Late summer can be a great time to extend your vegetable harvest. The soil remains warm, which is perfect for rapid seed germination and the cooling air temperatures mean a less stressful environment for maturing plants.

The cooler weather makes it the perfect time to sow leafy greens because the milder temperatures stimulate the plants to release sugars, resulting in sweeter or milder flavored produce. This is in contrast to the heat of summer, which can cause plants to bolt (produce flowers prematurely) and become bitter. Consider planting lettuce, Swiss chard, kale, arugula and spinach, all of which will add great flavor to salads and soups.

Broccoli, cauliflower and cabbage should be started from seed and transplanted into the garden in early August. These plants,

too, respond well to cooler temperatures and can withstand a light frost as the fall season arrives.

Fast growers like radishes are also excellent crops for late summer and can still be sown until late August. Turnips can be planted as late as the end of August for a fall crop.

Late summer is also the time when we should be thinking about dividing perennial plants. At the next meeting of the Norwood and District Horticultural Society, Jenny Gasparek, our President, will give a "how to" demonstration on dividing a variety of perennial plants. Plan to join us, Tuesday, September 9th at the Royal Canadian Legion in Norwood. Doors open at 6:30 p.m. and the meeting starts at 7:00 p.m. For more information, follow us on Facebook!

MEDIA RELEASE WEST NILE VIRUS DETECTED

Positive West Nile Virus Detected in Dead American Crows in Northumberland County Residents urged to take precautions against mosquito bites.

(JULY 17, 2025) — The Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit and Peterborough Public Health (now legally merged) are notifying the public that West Nile virus (WNV) has been detected in Northumberland County. This is the first confirmed case of WNV in the area this year.

The Health Unit received lab results from The Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative (CWHC) on Wednesday, July 16, 2025, confi rming that two American Crows who were found deceased in Hamilton Township, Northumberland County, have both tested positive for West Nile virus. The fi nding of WNV in the Health Unit area is not unusual, as the virus is typically detected around this time of year through routine mosquito surveillance.

West Nile virus is a viral infection primarily transmitted through the bite of infected mosquitoes

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RECIPE

CORN CAKES

August means fresh corn on the cob. Oh, that delightful first bite but what do you do with the leftovers?

Freeze some to make corn chowder in the fall.

Make a corn salad.

Or use some for corn fritters. Great for breakfast with maple syrup or at supper topped with sour cream and served with a salad.

Ingredients:

- 2 eggs beaten
- ½ cup milk
- 1-1/2 cups of leftover corn
- ½ tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp baking powder

Mix the eggs and milk together. Mix the dry ingredients together. Combine the dry and wet ingredients. Do not overmix. Heat a thin layer of oil in a skillet over medium heat. Drop the batter onto the oil using a tablespoon or cookie scoop. Flatten the batter out. Cook 2-3 minutes per side. Place on a paper towel to get rid of any excess oil. Serve immediately.






BELMONT-METHUEN AND HAVELOCK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

With summer half gone, the Belmont Methuen and Havelock Historical Society remains busy preparing inventory and displays as best we can. Building renovations continue. We still forward to hosting students and seniors in the fall despite the uncertainty of our future here. We'd like to celebrate Havelock all year long.

For example, the anniversary of an exciting episode in our history arrives on the 31st of August. Back in 1961 five armed, masked men executed a daring, daylight robbery of the TD Bank. It was well planned and they got away until an unlucky series of events led to their capture after an intense 4-day manhunt.



The thieves had escaped with \$230,000 but none of that was recovered when they were caught. What happened to the money remains a mystery. There are many more fascinating details to tell and we hope to follow up with more of this story.

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY - TUESDAY, JULY 8, 2025

- Council passed a resolution directing that the ice at the HBM Community Centre be installed at the same time as last year to allow
 the Havelock Minor Hockey Association to secure ice time and not delay the start of the hockey season due to the renovations that
 are taking place at the facility. Council approved the request from the Town Hall Improvement Committee to hold a classic car show
 fundraising event at Rotary Park on August 9, 2025
- Council approved the purchase of a Tire/Gravel Packer from Brandt Tractor Ltd.
- Council approved the expense for the lower library drawings to be paid from the Administration Reserve General Ledger Account.
- Council provided approval for the 2025 Community Recognition Awards nomination categories to be expanded to include the following two additional categories: Sporting Excellence and Acts of Heroism.
- Council approved the Private Road Grant Program received from the Fire Route 57 Road Association.
- Staff was authorized by Council to proceed with the repair of the Anderson Road boat launch.

STATION PLACE LTC HOME UPDATE:

At the Jul. 8th Regular Council meeting, Aon Long-term Care leaders Ray Barlow and Michael O'Keefe provided an update and photos of Station Place.

It's a beautiful home-like 128-bed long-term care facility located on a 10-acre site off Old Norwood Rd in Havelock, with 7 acres devoted to Station Place. It is 2 stories, 90,000 sq ft. with 4 self-contained "Home-Areas" having 32 beds each.

It has one Home-Area dedicated to dementia-care, as well as a large atrium lobby, fireside lounge, 2 contained garden courtyards, 4 dining rooms with small kitchen areas, serviced by the main floor kitchen, private dining rooms, patio café, a place of worship, therapy room, hair-dressing salon, and gazebo donated by the Lady McGill #471 Ladies Orange Benevolent Association.

Station Place operations will commence in September with a Grand Opening event to follow on October 24, 2025. Full event details to follow.
